Bringing down the cost of textbooks at SBVC

Students at San Bernardino Valley College will soon be able to save money on textbooks thanks to a \$31,000 state grant which incentivizes faculty and staff to adopt open educational resources – better known as OER – which are teaching, research and course materials that are freely available for students everywhere.

"At a time when our region and state needs more college-educated workers, this OER grant will allow us to tap into the innovative spirit of our faculty and staff to make the cost of learning more accessible and affordable for our students," said Romana Pires, faculty chair of sociology at San Bernardino Valley College and campus lead for the initiative.

Pires will work with the Academic Senate and College Council and various departments to ensure the success of the program and to achieve the benefits for students.

Specifically, the grant will support the following objectives:

- Faculty will adopt and use free and open educational resources in at least 31 sections by spring 2017 and this number will increase by at least 20% every academic year for the next four years.
- Students will have access to free online resources or low-cost hard copies in addition to student support services to deliver open instructional materials.
- Faculty will have access to professional development opportunities, and curated open educational resources to explore the use of public domain instructional materials in the classroom.

Funding for this measure was signed into law in 2015 by Governor Jerry Brown through Assembly Bill 798 by Assemblymember Susan Bonilla of Concord. More at: http://www.cool4ed.org/



SBCCD Board of Trustees endorse Prop. 55 to reinforce California's investment in community colleges

San Bernardino Community College District's governing Board of Trustees voted unanimously on Thursday, October 20 to endorse Proposition 55, which funds K-12 schools, community colleges and Medi-Cal by maintaining the current tax rate on high-income earners. Proposition 55 appears on the November 8, 2016 California General Election ballot.

"Thanks to California voters, we're steadily moving past the devastating budget cuts to public higher education that occurred during the height of the 'Great Recession.' While there is more work to be done, we believe that Proposition 55 will enable us to continue investing in the well-being of our youth and future workforce," said Bruce Baron, Chancellor of the San Bernardino Community College District, which includes Crafton Hills College and San Bernardino Valley College.

In 2012, voters approved Proposition 30, which temporarily raised the income tax rate on individuals earning more than \$250,000 and couples making more than \$500,000 per year. Depending on their earnings, high-income taxpayers pay an extra 1 percent,

2 percent or 3 percent tax on part of their incomes. These tax rates are scheduled to expire at the end of 2018.

If voters approve Proposition 55 on Nov. 8, the 2012 income tax rate will continue until the end of 2030.

According to the non-partisan Legislative Analyst Office, the revenue from Proposition 55 could result in \$4 billion and \$9 billion annually from 2019 to 2030 for education, health care, budget reserves and debt payments.

SBCCD first Inland college to partner with CA Secretary of State to boost millennial voter turnout

San Bernardino Community College District's governing Board of Trustees voted on Thursday, October 20 to approve a memorandum of understanding with the California Secretary of State's office to encourage voter registration among the 23,000 students who attend Crafton Hills College and San Bernardino Valley College.

SBCCD is the first community college district in Riverside and San Bernardino counties to sign the California Students Vote Project agreement. With more than 4 million people and 52 cities, the two counties comprising Inland Southern California are two of the state's largest in terms of geography and population.

"Increasing civic engagement and voting participation among our younger generations, regardless of party affiliation, reinforces our mission of building a stronger region," said Bruce Baron, Chancellor of the San Bernardino Community College District. "We look forward to working collaboratively with the California Secretary of State's office to expand the voting population of our state and Inland Southern California."

In late September, both colleges won a competitive grant of \$10,000 each by the Foundation for California Community Colleges Civic

Engagement Pilot Project, awarded to up to 25 community colleges throughout the state. Funds help train student volunteers at the campus level and equip them with non-partisan tools, including Wi-Fi-enabled tablets, to register voters and educate their peers.

"The millennial generation, born between 1980 and 1995, actually outnumbers Baby Boomers," said Jordan Mack, who is encouraging students to vote as an intern in the Crafton Hills College Office of Student Life.

"Promoting civics and student engagement through a non-partisan voter registration initiative is critical to educating young people about the important issues that face our communities. We are the people that can change the world through political participation," said Mack.

The memorandum of understanding encourages SBCCD and the Secretary of State's office to jointly implement best practices as outlined by the California Students Vote Project. Outreach activities include: asking students during optimal time periods or via their student portals to register to vote, sending all-campus emails and notifications about the importance of voting before voter registration deadlines and elections.



The Board of Trustees of the San Bernardino Community College District is the governing body of the District. The Board is established by, and derives its power and duties from, the Constitution of the State of California and the Statutes of California as adopted by the Legislature and issued in the California Education Code, and the directives of the Board of Governors, California Community Colleges, listed in Title V, California Code of Regulations.

Seven trustees, elected from your communities, and two student representatives elected by their respective campuses govern SBCCD. Trustees serve a four-year term, while the non-voting student trustees serve a one-year term.

All regular and special meetings of the Board, except as otherwise required or permitted by law, are open to the public so that citizens may have the benefit of Board deliberations concerning items under consideration.
