Although this request is originating in the Theatre Department, the need for additional technical support is campus-wide. Currently, two part time technical assistants are responsible for multiple facilities, including the Auditorium and the PAC in North Hall. In addition to providing support for Music and Theatre events, the technical assistants provide support for various campus meetings and events. They also work hands-on with the THART 160x4 students. Despite the efforts and energy expended by the current assistants, the workload exceeds 38 hours per week.
