The Library Technology Program has undergone some curricular changes since the last program efficacy in order to realign the program with current library practice. The primary changes to curriculum were:

- Changing LIB064 Introduction to Libraries for Library Technicians from a 1 unit to 4 unit and adding content
- Changing LIB070 Information Literacy and Research from a 1 unit class to a 2 unit class and adding content.
- Combining LIB066 Library Media Services and LIB069 Library Automation for Library Technicians to create LIB070 Library Technology and Media services and realigning content.
- Creation of LIB063 Survey of Literature for Library Technicians

The majority of Library Technology courses are being taught online. The remaining on-campus

courses LIB062 Care and Repair of Library Materials and LIB 067 Library Technical Services previously taught in different semesters are now both being taught in the Fall semester on Saturdays.
