How To Apply - Summer/Fall 2020

Step 1

Submit completed Packets to Admissions & Records DropBox outside of ADSS/100 OR email@cuments.

Step 2

- Complete the Online Orientation.
- Schedule the Guided Self-Assessment Questionnaire. Appointments made online or your WebAdvisor account.

Step 3

- Wait for decision via your SBVC Student Email Account (Processing time 2-4 weeks).
- Register for your approved course in WebAdvisor during Open
 Registration (May 01 thru Aug 16, 2020)

Note: If your class is full, try adding to the Waitlist. If the semester begins and you're still not registered into your approved class, attend the very first class meeting to possibly obtain a Web Authorization Code from the instructor.

(When deadline dates land on a weekend, applications will be accepted through the the best business day).

11th & 12th Grades

Those seeking academic classes that are transferable to a four-year university (courses imbered 100 or higher) must be in the 11th or 12th grade, with an academic high school GPA of 2.0 or higher, and have good grades in courses which are similar to the onesthey want to take at SBVC.

9th through 12th Grades

Those seeking vocational classes (classes which prepare students for employment in specific trade or occupation) should have a 2.0 GPA, and have good grades in classes which are similar to the ones they want to take at Valley.

Concurrent high school students may not enroll in Basic Skills courses (Courses numbered 2000 or higher), Kinesiology (aka PE) courses, or any course which is available to them in high school. High School students are limited to 11 units per semester.

Dear Parents,

Just like you, we want your child's first experience with college to be a successfulone. One of the most important factors will be your support. Toward that end, it is helpful to be aware of some of the differences between high school and college.

Attendance will not be monitored in the same way as high school. If your student doesn't attend regularly, no office will call to notify you of this.

Courses are designed for adult students, and may contain information of adult nature.

You will not have access to your child's grades or records. Please read further onthe FERPA policy.

Instructors are not available for parent conferences. Also, your student will be welcomed at the Student Health Center where they will have access to reporoductive information, contraception, and other health services.

College textbooks can be expensive but many classes are now equipped with Zero CostTextbook information. If you choose to purchase a book online besides the SBVC Bookstore, be sure you are purchasing the correct edition of the correct book.
