Note: additional requirements for admission such as completion of at least 60 transferable units with a minimum GPA of 2.0 are also needed (refer to detailed CSU Admission requirements listed below).

CSU Upper Division (Junior Standing) Transfer/Admission Requirements

1. Your overall grade point average (GPA) must be at least 2.0. Campuses or programs impacted (high demand) may require a GPA much higher than 2.0.
 2. Complete a minimum of 60 transferable semester units. Including completed coursework in the following ***"Golden Four" areas**:
 - (A1)- Oral Communication
 - (A2)- Written Communication
 - (A3)- Critical Thinking
 - (B4)- Mathematics/Quantitative Reasoning
- *All courses completed in "golden four" areas require a grade of "C" or better.**
3. Student must be in good standing at SBVC

Note: If you are pursuing a **high-unit major** such as engineering, some math-based fields, science, or other technical majors, you will need to work closely with a SBVC Counselor to plan which classes you should take for upper-division transfer. Some CSU campuses do allow high-unit majors to take fewer general education courses before transfer. Just remember, ultimately you will need to meet the general education requirements in order to graduate from CSU. If you enroll at CSU with few general education units, completion of your baccalaureate program may take longer than expected.

1. Apply for admission **EARLY** during the filing period!

2. **SBVC will certify Areas A through E individually; however CSU encourages students to complete all areas prior to transfer.**
 - a. CSU will not admit students until all grades are recorded for courses in **"Golden Four"** (all of Area A and B4).
 - b. When a course is approved for CSU GE, it applies for certification starting with the year of approval and ending when it is removed.
 - c. A single course may not be certified as meeting more than one category.
 - d. Students **must request official certification** of CSU GE Breadth requirements at the SBVC A&R Office.
3. **Students with AP/IB/CLEP examinations will receive appropriate CSU GE Breadth credit according to the CSU Office of the Chancellor guidelines.**
Refer to SBVC Catalog for complete list.
4. **Courses from other California Community Colleges will be evaluated according to the CSU GE Breadth pattern of those respective colleges.**
 - a. For out of state courses, the SBVC A&R Office will determine equivalency to SBVC courses.
 - b. Courses from foreign institutions may not be certified.
5. **For CSU GE Breadth certification purposes, students may use the catalog of entry or any catalog thereafter as long as continuous enrollment is maintained until transfer to CSU.**
CSU defines continuous enrollment as one semester or two quarters in each calendar year.
6. **Upon transfer, students will be required to complete at least nine units of upper-division general education courses at the CSU.**

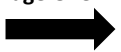
