

Graduates from San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) receive an Associate of Arts degree or an Associate of Science degree. To earn an associate degree, students must complete general education breadth requirements specified in Option #1 or Option #2 below, as well as additional units of electives and/or lower division requirements for a major.

Associate Degree: Option #1

The Option 1 associate degrees are general degrees designed for students who plan to attend a four-year college or university.

Associate Degree: Option 1a

The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC). Refer to the SBVC catalog for the IGETC requirements. In the process of completing this coursework the student must fulfill these general requirements:

1. Complete a minimum of 60 semester units of college coursework, with at least 12 semester units in residence at SBVC.
2. Earn a letter grade of 'C' or higher in each course.

OR

Associate Degree Option 1b

The California State University General Education-Breadth requirements (CSUGE). Refer to the SBVC catalog for the CSUGE requirements. In the process of completing this coursework the student must fulfill these general requirements:

1. Complete a minimum of 60 semester units of college coursework, with at least 12 semester units in residence at SBVC.
2. Earn at least a 2.0 grade point average for the CSUGE coursework. Earn a grade of 'C' or better for each course in the Oral Communication, Written Communication, Critical Thinking and Mathematics/Quantitative Reasoning categories.

OR

Associate Degree: Option #2

The general associate degree is designed for students planning to seek immediate employment after graduation. The general education breadth requirements for this degree are listed below:

1. ACAD 001 is required of all students taking nine (9) or more units per semester. This course must be completed within a student's first two semesters of coursework.
 - Exempt from this requirement upon completion of 30+ units of college credit or AA/AS degree or BA/BS degree.
 - Career-track students with vocational disciplines, which have articulated programs with four-year colleges or universities, apply for an exemption through the Department Chair or Division Dean of the area of study.
2. Complete a minimum of 60 semester units of college coursework, with at least 12 semester units in residence at SBVC.
3. Earn an overall grade point average of 'C' (2.00) or higher.
4. Complete coursework for an Associate of Arts or an Associate in Science major as listed in Part IV of the San Bernardino Valley College Catalog:
5. Demonstrate competency in English, mathematics and reading by satisfying the following criteria:
 - ENGL 101 or ENGL 101H** with a grade of 'C' or higher. **ASSESSMENT RESULTS: READ 920, READ 950, ENGL 914, ENGL 015, ENGL 101.** See counselor for possible options.
 - MATH 095** or a higher level course in mathematics with a grade of 'C' or higher, or mathematics proficiency examination, which is equivalent to a comprehensive final examination in MATH 095 with the equivalent to a grade of 'C' or higher, or a course from another college with a minimum of three semester units. **ASSESSMENT RESULTS: MATH 942, MATH 952, MATH 090, MATH 095,** or higher level course in mathematics. See counselor for other possible options.
- AND**
- READ 015** with a grade of 'C' or higher **OR** assessment into READ 100 **OR** completion of all courses required to satisfy minimum graduation requirements in Categories I, II, III as listed below with an overall grade point average of 2.00 or higher.
6. Complete 24 to 26 of the 60 semester units needed for graduation from the five subject categories as listed below:

1. Students file a graduation and/or Certificate Application at the Admissions & Records Office, AD/SS 100. An education plan or graduation check must be attached to the Graduation/Certificate Application. Check the school calendar in the *Schedule of Classes* or the college catalog for deadline filing dates.
2. Official transcripts from other colleges must be on file at the Records Office. Transcripts are evaluated for equivalency to SBVC courses for general education, and students request an official evaluation from the Records Office.
3. In order for course work completed at other colleges to be applied toward a major, a Modification of Major form must be approved.
4. **Liberal Arts Major:** New requirements for the major went into effect Fall 2008. Eighteen (18) units are required in one area of emphasis: Biological & Physical Sciences or Social & Behavioral Sciences or Humanities & Fine Arts. Refer to the college catalog for more information.
5. A single course cannot be used in more than one category. Consult with a counselor for more information.
