

Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC)

Completing the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) will allow a student to transfer from SBVC to a campus in either the University of California (UC) or the California State University (CSU) system without the need to complete additional lower-division general education courses. The IGETC is not an admission requirement for transfer to UC or CSU, nor is it the only way to fulfill lower-division and general education requirements prior to transfer.

Note: IGETC may not be recommended for all majors. Students planning to transfer with a Science, Technology, Engineering or Math (STEM) major are advised to work closely with a SBVC Counselor to plan which lower-division major preparation and general education courses are needed to transfer.

Important Information

- 1. Apply for admission EARLY during the filing period!**
 - a. Refer to <http://admission.universityofcalifornia.edu/how-to-apply/dates-deadlines/> for UC application submission deadlines.
 - b. Refer to www.calstate.edu/apply for CSU application submission deadlines.
- 2. Minimum of sixty (60) UC transferable semester units (IGETC requirements and major preparation courses) are required to transfer in upper-division (junior) status.**
 - a. All courses must be completed with a "C" or better grade.
 - b. Courses may be counted in one GE area only, with the exception of Area 6A: Language Other than English (LOTE) requirement for UC's.
- 3. Students with AP/IB examinations will receive appropriate IGETC area credit according to The IGETC Standards, Policies and Procedures.**

- 4. Students must request official certification of IGETC requirements at the SBVC Admission & Records (A&R) Office.**
 - a. When a course is approved for IGETC, it applies for certification starting with the year of approval and ending when it is removed.
 - b. Students may receive full or partial certification. Partial certification is defined as completing all but two courses from any area except those listed in Areas 1 and 2. **Note:** Regardless of certification, students must meet minimum UC/CSU transfer admission requirements.
 - c. SBVC will certify coursework from other campuses according to the IGETC list of the originating campus.
 - d. Official transcripts from high school and other colleges and universities must be on file at the SBVC A&R Office.
 - e. Courses from foreign institutions are not permitted to be certified except for the Language Other than English (LOTE) requirement.
