

Welcome to San Bernardino Valley College!

Follow these easy steps that it will take you from application to registration.

STEP 1. APPLICATION (ADMISSIONS)

An application must be completed by all **NEW** students and returning students who have had a break in enrollment. You may apply online at <http://www.valleycollege.edu> and click on "Apply For Admission."

Upon completion of the application process, you will be sent a **Student Identification Number (new students)** by e-mail. This is mandatory for all the other steps of enrollment! Additional information is available on page X or by calling the **Admissions Office: (909) 384-4401**.

STEP 2. ORIENTATION

Orientation will provide you information on how the college system may work for you! You will learn about Student Support Services, Financial Assistance, Clubs and Organizations, Academic Success Tips, How to Establish an Educational Goal, Course Requirements for Associate, Certificate, and Transfer Programs, rights and responsibilities as a student, and other information for your academic success.

After Orientation, you will need to schedule an assessment appointment. (If you prefer further guidance, you may meet with a counselor later during the semester to develop a long-term education plan. You can register for SDEV 010 – a course in Educational Planning)

STEP 3. ASSESSMENT

After completing your orientation, you must take the assessment exam for placement into **English, reading and math, or ESL (English as a Second Language)**. Appointments can be made by calling the **Assessment Office: (909) 384-8955** or in person in the Assessment Center, AD/SS 101 or in the Admissions and Records Office, AD/SS 100. You may also visit <http://www.valleycollege.edu/student-services/counseling/assessment> for more information. **Note:** Assessment testing begins promptly at the times designated, so do not be late. You **must** bring your **Student Identification Number** and a **valid photo identification card**. New students must bring an orientation completion certificate as well.

STEP 4. REGISTER FOR CLASSES

Follow the advice that you received in Orientation. Use the Education Plan provided to you by the counselor and pick the courses that apply to your goal. You may register online on or after your priority registration date.

STEP 5. PAY FEES

Fees can be paid in four ways:

1. Online: www.valleycollege.edu, Current Students ➡ WebAdvisor (by credit card)
2. U.S. Mail (by check or money order). PLEASE WRITE YOUR STUDENT ID# ON THE CHECK OR MONEY ORDER.
3. Place your check or money order in drop-box located in front of the Admissions Office. PLEASE WRITE YOUR STUDENT ID# ON THE CHECK OR MONEY ORDER.
4. In person at the Admissions Office.

Financial Aid is available to those who qualify. Go to the Financial Aid Office (AD/SS-106) or visit the website at www.valleycollege.edu/Financial_Aid/ for additional information.

STEP 6. COUNSELING

As a new student, meeting with a counselor is very important. A counselor is an excellent resource to help you with career choices and to answer questions that you have regarding your educational goal. Counselors will help you find the right level of course study and assist you in creating an Educational Plan as well as direct you to other services. Schedule an appointment with a counselor for a two-year educational plan during a "non-registration" time period. The recommended time is between: September – October or February – March. Counselors are available throughout the Fall and Spring Semesters offering same day appointments on a first-come, first-served basis.

Important Changes

○ Why did enrollment fees go up from \$36/unit to \$46/unit?

The California Legislature sets the enrollment fee structure for all 112 community colleges in California. As part of their budget cuts in 2011, the Legislature increased enrollment fees from \$36 per unit to \$46 per unit starting in summer 2012. Please note that students enrolling at SBVC will be required to pay these higher per-unit fees starting with the summer 2012 term. ○ Why did the name of my Priority Registration category change?

Starting with the summer 2012 term, new titles have been given to registration categories without changing the actual criteria for qualifying within that category. For example, what was previously titled “Priority Registration” (EOP&S, DSPS, Veterans, etc.) has been newly-titled as “Priority A”. Consequently, the previous title of “Category A” (40-109 units completed and athletes) has been changed to “Priority B” and so on. As an additional example, if you registered during “Category C” in spring 2012 (15-29.9 units completed at SBVC), the corresponding title for that same registration priority level is now called “Priority D”. Although it may appear on the surface that your priority registration category dropped to a lower level, it is simply a shifting of the naming of the categories and any units completed at SBVC will be reflected in your priority registration eligibility. If you have any questions about your priority registration category, please contact the SBVC Admissions/Records Office in AD/SS 100.

○ How many times can I repeat a class?

As of summer 2012 and in compliance with new Title 5 regulations, SBVC students who are attempting to improve a substandard grade in a non-repeatable course will be limited to three enrollments in that course, including any enrollments which took place prior to Summer 2012. For example, if a student initially enrolled in MATH 095 and earned an F, then later enrolled in MATH 095 and withdrew, and again enrolled in MATH 095 and earned a D, that student would no longer be allowed to enroll in MATH 095. Contact the Admissions/Records Office in AD/SS 100 with questions.



○ Can I still apply for financial aid if I don't have a high school diploma or GED?

All first-time SBVC students without a high school diploma or a GED who enroll in classes on or after July 1, 2012, will not be eligible for federal financial aid as a result of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2012 passed by Congress. This law applies to all colleges and universities. Students without a high school diploma or GED can still apply for scholarships and the Board of Governors (BOG) Waiver if they meet income and residency qualifications. For Fall 2012

○ Is there really a waiting list for classes that are full? How does it work?

Starting in the fall 2012 semester, SBVC is testing a “waitlist” for class sections within the English department to help provide a more objective and organized way of helping students enroll in the closed classes they need. Look for directions on how the process works by visiting www.valleycollege.edu/waitlist. Utilizing feedback from students and faculty during the fall semester, an improved full-feature “waitlist” will be ready for the Spring 2013 semester. If you have suggestions on how to improve the “waitlist” feature, send your feedback to waitlistcomments@valleycollege.edu.

○ Why am I being charged a Student Transportation Fee?

During student body elections in the Spring 2012 semester, SBVC students voted to approve a five-year agreement with regional bus transportation provider Omnitrans. The agreement extends the “Go Smart” program that was piloted in 2011-2012 and provided free bus transportation for students with a valid SBVC I.D. card. Students are eligible to ride for free any day of the week on any regularly-scheduled Omnitrans route—not just to/from SBVC. The non-refundable Student Transportation Fee of \$7.00 (for students with 6 units or less) and \$7.50 (for students with 6+ units) will be assessed to all students every semester (not including summer term). Please note that if you are enrolled in 6 units or less and add a class, your account may be charged for the extra assessment and you will be responsible for paying that additional fee within 3 business days or risk being dropped from your recently-added class. ○ Why do the official “withdraw” and “drop” dates seem earlier than last semester?

Starting in the fall 2012 semester, the official “drop” and “withdraw” dates have been shifted to earlier in the semester. Relative to the starting date of the class, the last day to withdraw from a class will be before 60% of the semester has passed (instead of 75% of the semester as per previous policy). To find out the exact dates for each of your classes, please check your registration statement in WebAdvisor.

○ Can I still park for free at the Pro Swap Meet?

Yes. However, due to a request by the owners of the Pro Swap Meet, parking will only be available until 4:00 p.m. on Mondays-Fridays. The gates may be locked by 4:30 p.m.

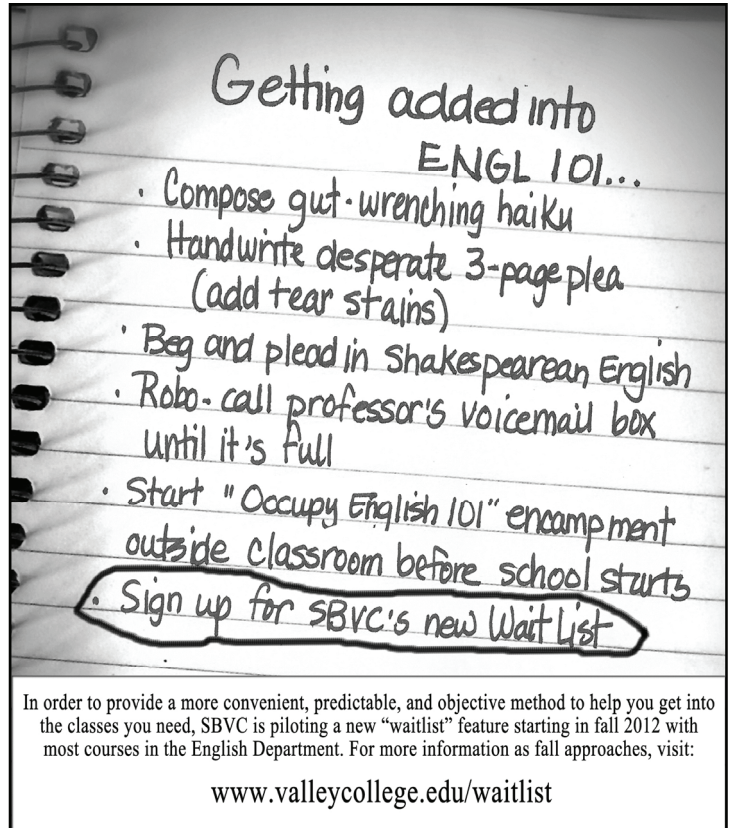

FEES, PAYMENT OPTIONS & YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

SBVC is one of the most affordable colleges in the country, but it isn't free. You are responsible for all fees related to your enrollment.

As a student at SBVC, you are responsible for registering for your classes, paying your fees, and if necessary, dropping your classes. If your fees are not paid in full, the college may drop you from your classes, **but this may not happen, and you should not rely on it.** If you do not drop your classes, you owe the fees, and may receive failing grades. So please – pay your fees on time and drop any classes that you can't complete.

RESIDENCY

To be declared a California resident, you must have been physically present in the state, continuously, for a year prior to the beginning of the term during which time you must have taken steps to make California your permanent residence. In matters of residency, the burden of proof lies with the student. **If the applicant is not 18 years or older**, s/he may derive residency status from their parents (or guardian) if the parent (or guardian) has established residency according to the above standard.

Non-California Residents are welcome to attend SBVC but are required to pay non-resident tuition, as well as the enrollment fees paid by California residents.

Members of the United States armed forces stationed in California on active duty are exempt from non-resident tuition for the duration of their attendance at a community college as long as they remain on active duty. Spouses and dependents are entitled to a waiver of the non-resident fee as long as they are continuously enrolled.

AB 540

1. SBVC, in compliance with California law, will waive non-resident tuition for non-resident students if they meet all of the following criteria:
 - You have attended a California high school for at least 3 years
 - You have a high school diploma (or equivalent)
 - You have applied for legal status – or will sign an affidavit stating your intent to do so.

Priority Registration

Students: If you experience difficulty registering and need assistance, please contact the HELP Desk at (877) 241-1756. Log on to www.valleycollege.edu, **Current Students** ⇒ **WebAdvisor** to [confirm](#) your registration category. Registration begins on **June 25, 2012**.

- All vehicles parked in Faculty/Staff parking must display an appropriate permit at all times. Vehicles without an appropriate Faculty and Staff permit will be cited regardless of the parking enforcement calendar. If you do not have a Faculty and Staff permit properly displayed you cannot park in designated Faculty & Staff parking.
- Parking permit enforcement for valid 2012/2013 parking permits will begin for students, faculty and staff on Tuesday, September 4, 2012. Vehicles that do not display a valid parking permit while parked in a SBVC parking lot will be cited as of that date.
- Pro Swap Meet parking will not be available for evening parking beginning June 18, 2012. You may continue to park at Pro Swap Meet without purchasing a parking permit; however, the parking lot will be closed as of 4:00 pm Monday through Friday and gates may be locked as of 4:30 p.m.

ORIENTATION/ASSESSMENT PROCESS AND ENROLLMENT

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

1. **All new and returning students may register online at www.valleycollege.edu.**

2. **Transcripts of Prior Work**

Students must have official transcripts of all college work not done at San Bernardino Valley College sent to the Admissions and Records Office (Administration/Student Services Building) if they are planning to attend. **If the student does not submit an application, the transcript will be destroyed.**

3. **Orientation/Assessment/Advisement**

All new students are required to participate in Orientation and Assessment unless specifically exempted from this process. When you submit an application for admission and you have received your SBVC student ID number, you will need to complete the following:

- Student orientation session: This can be completed in two ways, online or on campus.
 - For online session, visit web site: www.valleycollege.edu/webadvisor or
 - Make an onsite appointment for group session in the Assessment Center (AD/SS 101).

College is quite unfamiliar to you as a first semester college student. Orientation to college will dispel most of your unfamiliarity about SBVC. Through orientation, you will know course offerings and services including the expectations set before you, such as, college life and responsibilities as well as the college culture.

- Assessment Appointment:
 - Schedule an appointment with the Assessment Center (AD/SS 101) and in Admissions and Records (AD/SS 100).

SBVC uses the Accuplacer assessment test*. The test is primarily used to assist students in the following:

- Identify skill levels in English, reading, and math;
- Meet class prerequisite requirements;
- Choose appropriate classes;
- Develop student education plan.

*You may access test sample questions through www.collegeboard.com/student/testing/accuplacer

To make an appointment for English as a Second Language (ESL) assessment, please go to the Assessment Center (AD/SS 101).

To get an appointment for the Ability to Benefit Test (ATB) if you do not have a high school diploma or GED, please go to the Financial Aid Office in AD/SS 106) or visit: www.valleycollege.edu/Financial_Aid/.

Report at least fifteen minutes early on the assessment date you have chosen. Bring your appointment card with you as well as a photo ID (driver's license or school ID) and your SBVC ID number.

Advisement: Students must meet with a counselor prior to the start of their second semester of attendance to develop their two-year educational plan. You may go to the Counseling Department in AD/SS 103.

4. **You May Be Exempt From Assessment:**

You may be exempt from the English Assessment if:

- You received a grade of "C" or better in a prerequisite English course at the college level.

You may be exempt from the math Assessment if:

- You received a grade of "C" or better in a prerequisite math course at the college level.

You may be exempt from assessment if you meet at least one of the following criteria:

- Associate Degree or higher from a regionally accredited college or university
- An earned score of 3.0 or higher in Advanced Placement Tests in English and math
- Submission of assessment placement scores from another California Community College within the last two years
- Enrolling in courses to achieve or maintain certificate or license requirements which do not require math, reading, or English prerequisites
- Enrolling in courses for personal enrichment which do not require math, reading, or English prerequisites. A maximum of 12 units may be taken prior to Assessment.

POLICY ON ASSESSMENT

1. **All entering students are required to complete the San Bernardino Valley College assessment process unless exempted.**

2. **Assessment results are valid for two years.** After two years, students are to be reassessed if they have not satisfactorily completed an English, math or reading course at SBVC.

3. **Students may be reassessed once when one of the following situations exists:**

- When one full year has elapsed from previous tests;
- When recommended by the department chair or division dean to retake the test;
- When recommended by the Student Policy and Scholastic Standards Committee in accordance with the exemption permitted by the SBVC Policy on Assessment.

4. **Students who reassess will be advised that the most current assessment results will supersede all other test results.**

5. **Students may satisfy the prerequisite for English, math, and reading through:**

- An assessment process;
- Satisfactory completion of the prerequisite course; or
- Providing acceptable challenge documentation to the department chair or division dean.

PRIORITY REGISTRATION SCHEDULE

Priority registration begins on **June 25, 2012**. The registration system is available Monday-Saturday, 7:00 a.m. – midnight and Sunday, 7:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m. Please be aware that incomplete applications, prerequisite requirements, or academic and probationary issues may cause the system to disallow registration. We encourage you to pay with a credit card when you register. Those wishing to pay by cash or check have three business days to do so. Students who do not pay within three business days from the time of registration may be dropped.

REGISTRATION PRIORITIES

To determine your priority registration date and time, you need to know your priority level (Priority, A, B, C, D, E, F or G). To confirm your priority, log on to www.valleycollege.edu, **Current Students** ➡ **WebAdvisor**. Be sure to calculate both the number of units completed at SBVC and the number of units you are currently taking.

Priority A

- DSP&S, EOP&S/CARE, Active Military/Veterans and Foster Youth

Priority B

- Students enrolled at SBVC in Spring 2012 and who have completed 40 –109 units at SBVC
- Student athletes

Priority C

- Students enrolled at SBVC in Spring 2012 and who have completed 30 – 39.9 units at SBVC

Priority D

- Students enrolled at SBVC in Spring 2012 and who have completed 15 – 29.9 units at SBVC

Priority E

- Students enrolled at SBVC in Spring 2012 and who have completed up to 14.9 units at SBVC
- Middle College High School

Priority F

- Students who enrolled at SBVC previously but NOT in Spring 2012 who have reapplied for Fall 2012
- New students for Fall 2012 who have been assessed

Priority G

- New students for Fall 2012 who have NOT been assessed
- Students who have previously earned a Bachelor's degree or higher
- Continuing students with more than 110 units

- All students in the above listed priorities
- High School students who have been approved for Concurrent Enrollment

REFUNDS

Refunds are:

- processed automatically
- paid by check
- mailed to the address we have on file for you
- sent approximately 10 weeks after the beginning of the term
- subject to a \$10 processing fee

Refunds of \$15 or less cannot be processed.

You are eligible for a **full** refund if:

- you drop your class(es) before the beginning of the term (full-term classes)
- you drop your class(es) before the start of the class (short-term classes)

You are eligible for a **partial** refund (*enrollment fees & tuition only*) if:

- you drop your class(es) within the first two weeks of the term (full-term classes)
- you drop your class(es) within the first 10% of the class (short-term classes)

Students who are not eligible for a refund but who can document extenuating circumstances (accident, illness, death, etc.) may petition for a refund in the Admissions Office.

Section 58508 of Subchapter 6 of Chapter 9 of Division 6, Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations states that a community college district shall not refund any enrollment fee or differential enrollment fee paid by a student for program changes made after the first two weeks of instruction for a primary term-length course, or after the 10 percent point of the length of the course for a short-term course, unless the program change is a result of action by the district to cancel or reschedule a class or to drop a student pursuant to Section 58106 (g) where the student fails to meet a prerequisite.

HOW TO ADD OR DROP AFTER THE START OF CLASSES

If you revise your schedule and if the total number of units taken changes, the amount of your fees will also change. Payment is due immediately.

ADDING CLASSES: AFTER the registration period has closed and beginning on the first day of class, obtain a **webcode authorization sticker from your instructor**. Visit www.valleycollege.edu for instructions. Payment will be due immediately. **YOU CANNOT ADD A CLASS VIA THE WEB** after the "use by date" (located on the web authorization sticker) has expired.

Always retain your registration and schedule information until after final grades are posted.

DROPPING CLASSES: An instructor's signature is **NOT required to DROP a class**. All classes may be dropped using the web. **It is the student's responsibility to drop classes he/she is no longer attending. Be aware that dropping a class may affect your financial aid eligibility. Check with the Financial Aid Office.**

CÓMO AÑADIR O CANCELAR CLASES DESPUÉS DE QUE EL SEMESTRE HAYA EMPEZADO

Si usted cambia su horario, y el número de clases que iba a tomar cambia, la cantidad de su costo también cambiará. El pago de las clases hay que hacerse inmediatamente. Véa las páginas de "Reglas" al final de este horario de clases para que se entere de las reglas de reembolso si usted va a cancelar una clases.

CÓMO AÑADIR CLASES: Después de que se ha cerrado el período de matrículas y a partir del primer día de clases, hay formas que usted puede usar para añadir una clase, con tal de que haga su pago inmediatamente si el número de unidades que usted va a tomar ha cambiado. Si usted añade o cancela una clase después de que haya empezado el semestre, usted tendrá que pagar el costo.

Obtenga una estampilla de autorización de su profesor(a). Conéctese al sitio www.valleycollege.edu, entre a la página principal llamada "Campus Central", y siga las instrucciones para matricularse usando la información de la estampilla de autorización. Tendrá que hacer el pago inmediatamente. Usted no podrá añadir clases a través del Internet después de que haya expirado el "use by date" (en la estampilla de autorización), en caso que a su professor(a) se le hayan acabado las estampillas de autorización, él/ella podrá firmar su tarjeta de añadir clases. Después de firmada la tarjeta, esta tarjeta de añadir clases la debe de entregar a la oficina de Admisiones y Registros para procesamiento. Deberá pagar inmediatamente.

Por favor, siempre guarde su recibo de registro y la información de su horario y/o la copia de añadir/cancelar clases hasta que los grados finales hayan sido enviados.

CÓMO CANCELAR CLASES:

Usted no necesita la firma de su profesor(a) para cancelar clases. Usted puede usar el Internet. Conéctese con www.valleycollege.edu. **El estudiante tiene la responsabilidad de cancelar las clases que ya no esté tomando. Por favor recuerde que el cancelar clases puede afectar su elegibilidad para ayuda financiera. Consulte con la oficina de Ayuda Financiera antes de cancelar clases.**

Jonathan Ohayon

Jonathan Ohayon, 40, of Yucaipa, competed as the only archer for Canada's Olympic team at the 2004 Summer Olympics in Athens. Jonathan rose through the ranks very fast in his new sport and nearly qualified for the 1996 Olympics within his first three years as an archer.

"It seemed a very natural fit for me," said Jonathan, a web designer who is currently taking glassblowing classes at SBVC.

Archery has taken him around the world to places like Italy, Colombia, Mexico, France, and ultimately, Greece. Normal training would be four to eight hours a day, five days a week. Training for the Olympics was 12 hours a day, 6 to 7 days a week.

Throughout the spring of 2012, Jonathan found himself preparing for the 2012 Summer Olympics. "I'm actually shooting better than I ever have," said Jonathan, who also coaches archery students from age 5 to 70.

When he's not training, Jonathan's other love is glassblowing. He said his interest in art started at an early age because his grandfather, screenwriter Joseph Liss, was friends with abstract artists Willem de Kooning, Jackson Pollock and Mark Rothko.

About six years ago, Jonathan took painting and life drawing classes at Crafton Hills College. He really wanted to take the glassblowing class at SBVC but it was always full. Several years ago, there was an opening in the class and Jonathan has been creating glass ever since.

"We are so fortunate to have access to such an amazing facility and instructors and I am so grateful for the opportunity SBVC provides," said Jonathan.

Paul Prado

When Paul Prado enrolled in classes in the spring of 2009 at the age of 22, he knew he wanted something more from life besides jumping from one minimum wage job to another. A 2005 graduate of Redlands East Valley High School, Paul had no idea what he wanted to do with the rest of his life.

With more than 80 different fields of study from which to choose, Paul started taking classes in SBVC's Truck and Bus Technology (Diesel) Program for reasons that would become clearer with each passing day.

"At the time, I didn't actually have a job and did not even know how to change oil," Paul said. "But, my dad is a truck driver and I figured that this would give us something to talk about."

Paul's hypothesis was correct as his relationship with his father began to blossom—one lugnut at a time—as the two found common ground under the giant hoods of diesel trucks. "Over the last few years, I've gotten closer to my dad," Prado said. "Before, I could never talk or connect with him."

Paul kept focusing on his education while learning on the job at a \$12/hour apprenticeship at Schneider National, Inc., a trucking company in Fontana. Once Paul finished his Heavy Duty Diesel certificate program in December 2011, he was promoted to a full-time technician position that pays nearly \$20 per hour with benefits.

"Instructors here take extra time to make sure you feel comfortable—they teach you very well here. It's not just about the grease, it's learning about computers and technology," Paul said. "I am the first in my family to go college and I've worked really hard. My dad said he is proud of me and I've never heard him say that before—and that's why I couldn't wait to walk in May."

So, what is Paul's advice to people looking for direction in their lives or those without jobs? "There are lots of opportunities out there. Don't complain about your problems, go out there and do something with your life. This program pretty much saved my life. I've made mistakes and paid for them. But, without the education I've gotten here, I'd probably still be messing around with my life."

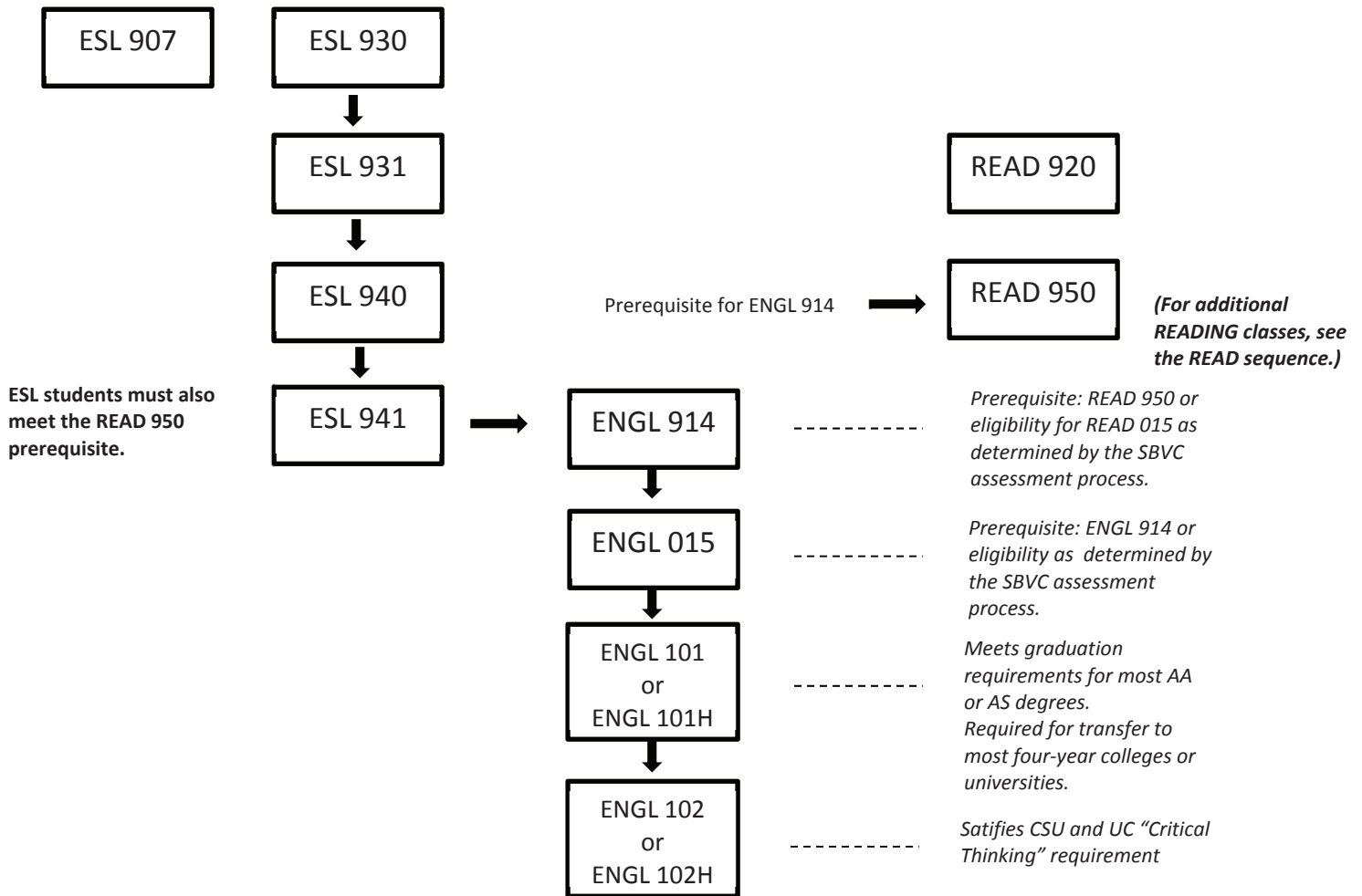

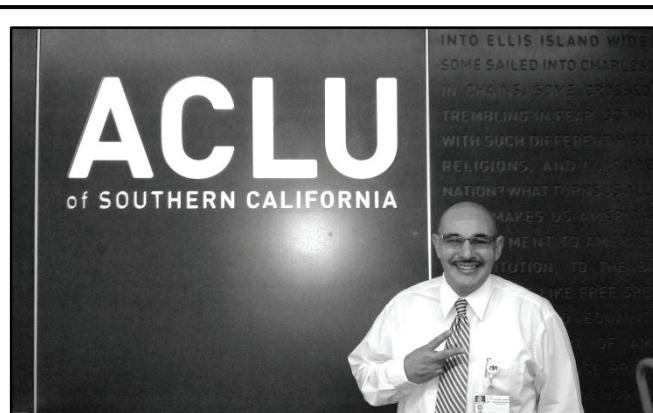

Ray Zacarias

Ray Zacarias didn't think about attending college when he was growing up in San Bernardino. Ray, now 42 and living in Covina, was just trying to survive his childhood. He witnessed domestic violence between his parents that led him to taking drugs and alcohol as a teen and culminated in a prison sentence as an adult for armed robbery.

Ray spent more than four years in prison. He was released in May 2001 and placed on three years of high control parole. Six months after being released from prison, Ray started drinking again. This time, he faced an ultimatum from his parole officer - go back to prison or attend a meeting of Narcotics Anonymous. Ray chose the latter.

"I took a look at everything going on in my life and I had nothing to lose because I had lost everything," he said.

Ray soon discovered SBVC through friends and started taking classes so he could earn a degree in alcohol/drug counseling. Clean and sober the past nine years, Ray has earned two associates degrees from SBVC, including one in Alcohol/Drug Studies, a bachelor's Degree in Social Work from California State University, San Bernardino and his master's degree in Social Work from USC.

Nine years after enrolling at SBVC, Ray has seen his life transform as a college graduate with four degrees. In 2011, he was promoted from a case manager for 14-to-25-year olds to Associate Vice President of Programs at Communities In Schools, a nationwide program aimed at keeping kids in school.

"Every opportunity I get, I talk to people on how education can really transform your life," said Ray. "There's nothing in life that I take for granted."

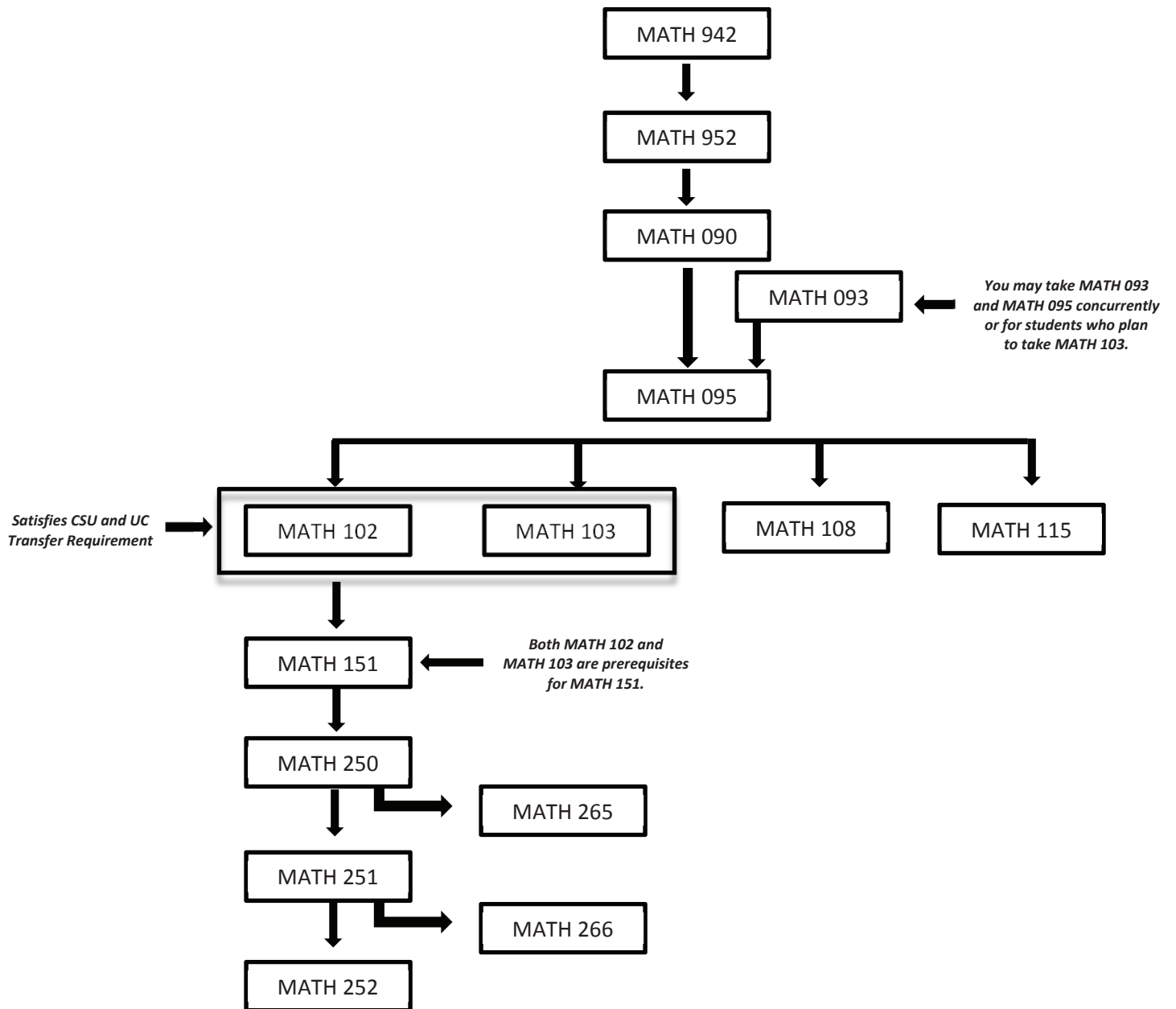

Vicente Cortez

As an impressionable young middle school student in 2004, Vicente Cortez experienced a 4th of July that year that would change the trajectory of his life forever as one of his schoolmates was chased down and shot in a gang-related drive-by shooting.

“When I saw one of my friends die right in front of me, I knew I didn’t want to end up dying in front of my parents or risking my family members going to jail and decided to go my own way,” Vicente said.

As he navigated the challenging teenage years, Vicente eventually ended up attending Middle College High School, the award-winning program on the campus where students take college courses in the morning and high school classes in the afternoon. After a friend told him about the field of psychiatric technology, Vicente got a head start in the SBVC Psychiatric Technician program by completing all of his prerequisites—even before receiving his high school diploma in 2009.

“The program was hard—and, considering that I was young, I think some people didn’t expect me to follow through and thought I might fail,” Vicente said. “But the professors were awesome and I used all of that doubt to prove everybody wrong. I knew that as long as you have a heart for what you want to do, you can do whatever you want.”

Vicente graduated from SBVC’s Psychiatric Technician Ceremony in August 2011, immediately passed his certification exams, and has been applying for positions at local hospitals and mental health facilities. As the first in his family (and his extended family) to graduate from college, Vicente understands the critical role he plays in being an example for his younger siblings who are age 15 and 9.

“I’ve tried to set the bar high so that they can reach it and aim to go higher,” Cortez said. “My parents left Mexico to live here and provide a better opportunity for our family. They did their part to give us a better future. And my way of thanking them for that is to have a career and do what I can do to make them happy and help them.”

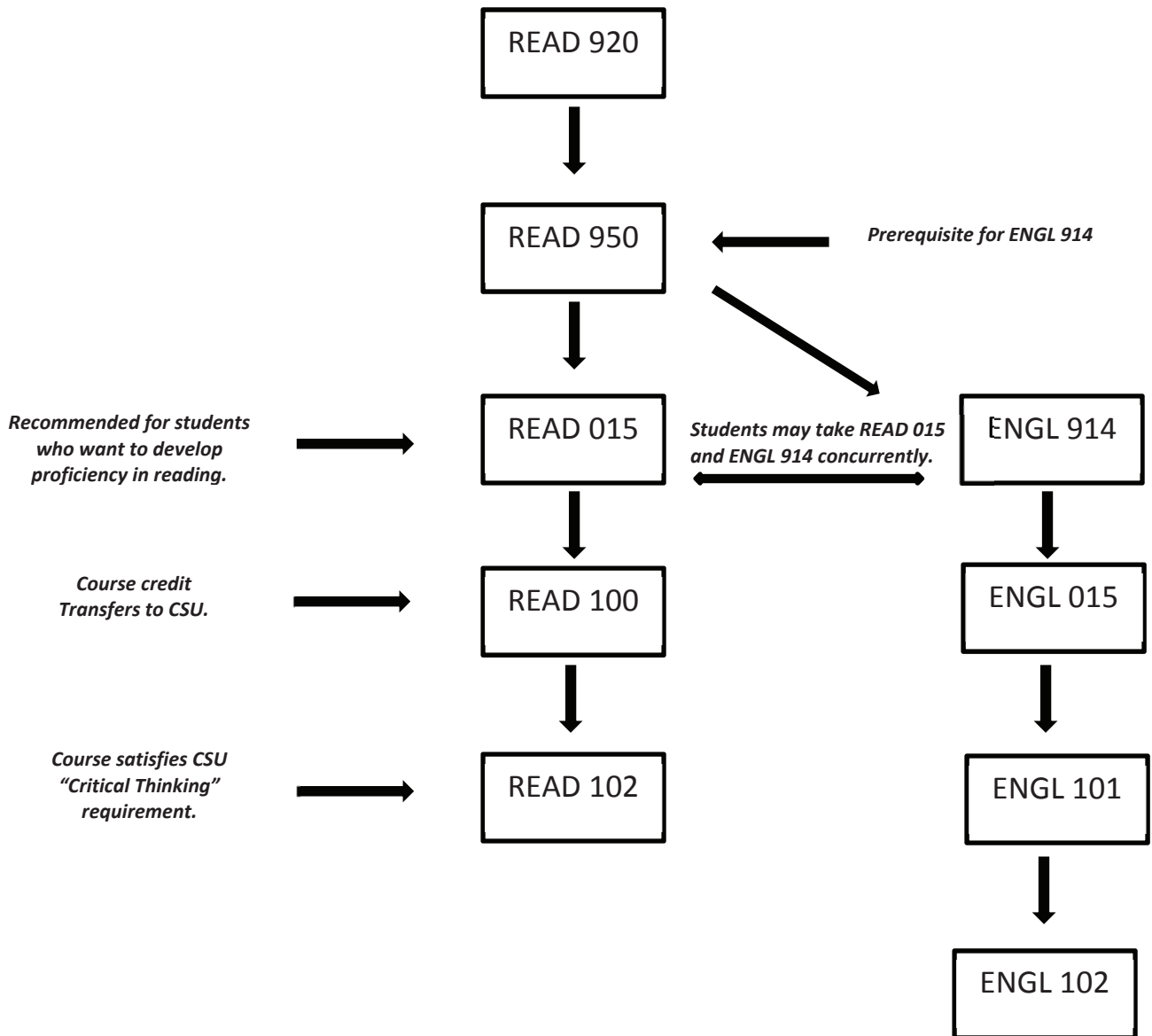

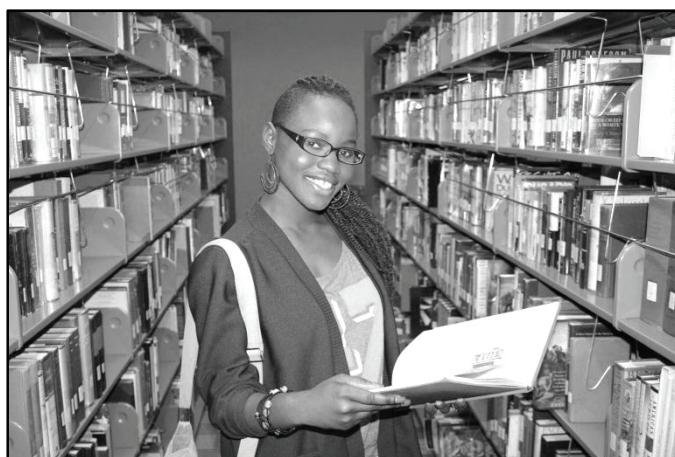

(Online & Hybrid Sections)

How to Succeed in a fully Online Course or Hybrid Course

Successful students claim that determination, planning, and self-motivation are needed to complete a course that lacks the regular meetings of an on-campus structure. Here is a plan of action that might help you.

1. For an online or hybrid course, access the instructor's website to get a copy of the syllabus and learn what is expected of you as a student.
For a hybrid course, attend the first on-campus meeting to meet the instructor, understand the course goals and requirements, and receive the course syllabus and assignments.
2. Read the study materials related to assignments as presented by the instructor. Take notes and highlight important information.
3. Log in to your online server several times a week to keep up with new messages from the instructor and classmates.
4. Be aware of due dates and do not wait until the last hour to send them.
5. For a hybrid course, formulate a list of questions during your study time to present to the instructor at the on-campus meetings or to post to your online class or call the instructor during his or her scheduled office hours.
6. Form a support group with other members of the class to review and discuss the content of the course.

Are you a Candidate for an Online or Hybrid Class?

This assessment is provided to help you decide if online or hybrid learning is appropriate for you. This exercise is an indicator but not a definitive answer. The assessment covers two parts: Learning Style and Technical Aspects.

Learning Style

- Do you stay on task without direct supervision?
- Can you prioritize your own workload and adhere to timelines?
- Do you usually understand and properly interpret written materials, especially instructions?
- Could you allocate as much time in your schedule as you would for a "traditional" class but with more flexibility?
- Are you able to attend some class meetings on campus (less than 6 a semester)?
- Would you enjoy the new experience of learning by way of a computer?

If you answered "YES" to the Learning Style questions, continue to the next section.

Technical Aspects for ONLINE and HYBRID

- Do you have a computer system available to you that can access the Internet?
- Could you "go online" multiple times a week?
- Have you opened and sent e-mail messages?
- Have you installed a program after "downloading" it from a remote computer to your computer? Do you know how to "copy and paste" text from a word processing document to an email message?

If you answered "YES" to the ONLINE questions, you meet the conditions for online delivery.

Conditions

Online courses require structure, which you will create for yourself. You will need self-discipline to adhere to your self-made schedule. Much of the material covered in a Distributed Education course will require that you learn from reading textbooks, Internet-based articles, and written materials from the instructor.

Benefits

The beauty of Distributed Education learning is the flexibility of time available for you, as the student, to access the virtual classroom or to view TV programs. You can set your class time around your work schedule and family or social activities. You will soon realize the savings normally incurred with driving time and vehicle-related costs. If you take only D.E. courses you won't have to deal with parking constraints on a weekly basis. Plus, there may also be a reduction in childcare costs. You could also benefit by combining D.E. courses with traditional classes. Now it's your choice. Check with an Academic Counselor to determine which classes you need, then see if they are listed in this schedule. Distributed Education may not be for everybody. However, for those who are self-motivated, it could prove to be an invaluable experience.

SERVICES AND POLICIES FOR STUDENTS

Address Changes

All changes to your contact information can now be done online. Log into WebAdvisor, select 'Contact Information' and make all necessary changes.

Associated Student Government

The Associated Student Government (ASG) is the official student government organization. The ASG represents all SBVC students. The primary responsibility of ASG members is to represent student interests on college, district and statewide committees. The Office of Student Life (OSL) assumes a leadership role in creating a campus environment that integrates the learning experience with academic curriculum. We provide opportunities to develop and enhance characteristics of leadership, interpersonal skills, and personal growth.

ASB Discount Sticker

Students who purchase a sticker are entitled to many benefits including a 5% Bookstore discount, free admission to athletic events, and certain discounts at local businesses. The sticker is purchased at the point of registration or at the Bookstore after obtaining a student ID card. For more information, contact the ASG office at (909) 387-1614.

Attendance

Students will be told at the beginning of each class exactly what is expected regarding attendance. The instructor's decision is final. In the event that an absence is unavoidable, students are responsible for notifying instructors. Failure to attend class meetings during the first week of a term may result in a student being dropped from the class.

Auditing

Attending classes without formally registering is NOT permitted.

Bookstore

The Bookstore, located in the Campus Center, Room 123, sells textbooks and a wide variety of supplies, software, sportswear, accessories, and gift items. The Bookstore has the upcoming session's textbooks available one week prior to the start of classes. Bookstore hours vary throughout the semester. Check Acceptance Policy for the Bookstore:

The Bookstore will accept payment with a check if the following conditions are met:

- The student must present a valid driver's license or a California state identification card.

- The check must be imprinted with a name and street address. (Post Office boxes are NOT accepted.)
- A phone number is required.
- The check must be made out to the "SBVC Bookstore" and will be accepted for the amount of purchase only.

Refund Policy for the Bookstore:

- Textbook refunds are given the first two weeks of the Fall/Spring semesters and the first week of Summer sessions. Students enrolled in short-term classes have exactly one week from the start date of class for textbook return/exchange. After the above refund period, textbooks must be returned within 24 hours from the date of purchase in order to qualify for a refund. Textbooks purchased outside of the first two weeks of the semester are **not returnable**.
- Supplies will be refunded if the items are returned in new, unopened condition within three days from the date of purchase.
- An original register receipt and personal identification are required to exchange/return items. (Note that there will be a seven-day period from the day a check was written to the day a cash refund will be distributed.)
- To receive a full refund, new textbooks must be returned in new condition. If they are not but are in resalable condition, refunds will be granted at 75% of the new price.
- No refunds will be given on shrink-wrapped textbooks, reference books or special order books.

Buyback Policy for the Bookstore:

Textbooks can be sold back to the Bookstore during the first and last week of each semester or session. (Please note that the Bookstore does NOT buy back workbooks.) The Bookstore will buy back textbooks at 50% of the new price and 50% of the used price if:

- The textbook has been assigned by an instructor for the upcoming semester.
- The book is in good condition.
- The book is on the Buyback "Guarantee" Program.
- The book is needed by the Bookstore.

A book wholesaler manages the buybacks and may also buy other books at up to 30% of the original price.

Bulletin Boards

The Student Life Office must approve all posters, ads and announcements before these items can be posted on public campus bulletin boards. Note: some bulletin boards are for private office use only and are identified with the office name.



Campus Business Office

The Campus Business Office is located in the Administration/Student Services (AD/SS) Building, Room 206. This office processes deposits for ASB, Clubs and Trust accounts; distributes financial aid, scholarship, care and loan checks to students; receipts payments for student obligations such as payments, returned checks, parking citations, etc; and parking decals. In addition, the staff provides accounting services for the ASB, Clubs and Trust Accounts. For additional information, please call (909) 384-4453.

The SBVC Child Development Center, located at 701 South Mt. Vernon Ave. (corner of Grant and "K"), is monitored by the California State Department of Education and subject to child care licensing regulations established by California's Department of Social Services for center-based care. We strive to provide the highest quality of early care and education for San Bernardino Valley College students and the children of our community. The program exists and operates with four primary elements: **Services to children and families, demonstration, professional development and parent education.** The Center is open from 7:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m., Monday – Friday. Cheating and Plagiarism

It is the belief at San Bernardino Valley College that students share a responsibility with their instructors for assuring that their education is honestly attained. Children on Campus and in the Classroom

Complaints

Any complaint about a grade, an instructor or course content should be made to the instructor involved, then to that instructor's Faculty Chair, then to the Division Dean of that department.

Counseling Center

The Counseling faculty of the Counseling Department (AD/SS Building, Room 103) assists students in making informed decisions about their academic, career, and life goals. In addition, counselors help students select courses needed to meet requirements for Associate degrees, certificates, and transfer.

Same day counseling appointments are available on a first-come, first-served basis. For a two-year educational plan, appointments are to be made during non-registration days between September through October for fall and February through March for spring.

The Counseling Department offers a variety of services and interventions aimed at student success including academic counseling, career planning, as well as short-term personal counseling and referral. Credit Hours (Units)

One credit is awarded for each 16-18 lecture hours of instruction, or for 48-54 laboratory hours, or for appropriate combinations of lecture and laboratory hours. For each hour in lecture, students are expected to spend at least two hours of work outside of class engaged in reading, completing assignments, or other activities related to the course.

Disabled Student Programs & Services (DSP&S)

Library

The SBVC Library houses an outstanding collection of over 100,000 volumes, with holdings information accessible through an online catalog which displays items in both the SBVC and Crafton Hills College Libraries. The catalog is available at <http://library.valleycollege.edu/>. One or more copies of most in-demand textbooks used at SBVC are available for in-Library use through the "Textbook Bank." In addition, there are 300 current print magazine subscriptions, hundreds of instructor-placed Reserves, and an extensive backfile of magazine volumes. A 41-workstation database network provides access to thousands of newspapers, magazines, journals and other materials supporting research. Enrolled students may request a password so that they can access these reference databases from their home computers. The Library also houses the campus' open computer laboratory, with over 100 PCs, Macs, and printing/scanning/copying services available to meet

students' needs in completing class assignments. Faculty librarians are available to help students learn research skills to find materials for term papers and other assignments. Library cards are free and will be issued upon proof of attendance. When classes are in session, the Library is open Monday through Thursday from 7:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. and on Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 12 noon. Between semesters, hours are as posted. Matriculation

Matriculation is a process that brings the college and the student into an agreement for the purpose of realizing the student's educational goals. The primary purpose of matriculation is student success.

The college agrees to provide:

- An admissions application process.
- An orientation to the college's programs, services and assistance to develop a 1st semester Educational Plan.
- An assessment of the student's study skills, English language proficiency, computational skills, goals, career aspirations, academic performance and needs for special services.
- Counseling, courses, and advisement to develop a student educational plan.
- Follow-up evaluation of each student's progress in achieving his or her education plan.

The student agrees to:

- Express at least a broad educational intent upon admission.
- Declare an educational goal by the time the student has completed 15 units.
- Attend classes.
- Work diligently to complete course assignments.
- Demonstrate effort toward attainment of an educational goal.
- Meet with a counselor to develop a student educational plan that will meet his/her unique needs.

Matriculation goals are partially fulfilled through the ACAD 100 class and SDEV 010 and 102 classes. Students who intend to graduate from San Bernardino Valley College are required to complete ACAD 100 during one of the first two semesters in which they are enrolled in 9 or more units.

Non-Discrimination Policy

San Bernardino Community College District and its two colleges, San Bernardino Valley College and Crafton Hills College, are committed to non-discrimination. Federal laws and District policies strictly prohibit all types of discrimination, including sexual harassment and inequities based on race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, physical disabilities or mental impairments, or sexual orientation. language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in vocational education programs.

Parking

A parking decal or a daily permit is required to park in all college streets and lots. All semester, and summer parking decals are purchased online. Login to your WebAdvisor account and click on "SB Valley Student Parking Decals." Daily permits may be purchased from dispensers located in Student Lots 1, 5, 7, 8 and 9. Valid and properly displayed permits are required to park at San Bernardino Valley College at all hours Monday through Thursday and Friday until 4:30 p.m. Cars will not be given parking permit citations from Friday at 4:30 p.m. until Monday at 7:00 a.m. Also note **free parking** at the Pro Swap Meet, 632 S. Mt. Vernon (across from SBVC Auditorium).

Parking fees are as follows:

One Semester (Fall or Spring):	\$30.00
with BOG Waiver:	\$20.00
Summer Session:	\$15.00
Daily Permit:	\$ 2.00

Individuals with disabilities must display a valid DMV Handicap Permit placard and a valid college parking decal/permit to park in designated disabled parking spaces.

The San Bernardino Community College District is not responsible for loss or damage to vehicles that are parked or stored on college property. Protect your vehicle and its contents by locking your car!

Purchasing Parking Decals

SBVC has automated the purchasing process for student parking decals. There are two methods to purchase your parking decal:

Method 1: Purchase Parking Decals Online

To purchase a parking decal online, you will need the following:

1. The ability to log into WebAdvisor
2. A valid credit or debit card
3. Make, model, year, color of car plus your license plate number and state of issue
4. Valid mailing and e-mail addresses.

Method 2: Unable to Purchase Online, Then Purchase Parking Decals on Campus

To purchase a parking decal on campus, you will need the following:

1. The ability to use a computer on campus
2. The ability to log into WebAdvisor
3. Cash or check payable in the Campus Business Office, AD/SS 206
4. Make, model, year, color of car plus your license plate number and state of issue
5. Valid mailing and e-mail addresses

All parking decals will be sent by U.S. mail to the mailing address you provide. If needed, you may print a temporary pass at the end of the online transaction to display on your dashboard until the actual parking decal arrives. If you have any problems, call the 800-number provided at the Credentials site.

Pass/No Pass

Students who wish to be graded in any class on a Pass/No Pass basis must file the appropriate form in the Admissions & Records Office (AD/SS Building, Room 100). The paperwork must be filed no later than the end of the first 30% of the course. Once Pass/No Pass has been selected as a grading option, a letter grade (A-F) cannot be issued.

Prerequisites, Corequisites, Departmental Advisories, and Limitations on Enrollment

Course information in this schedule of classes may include a prerequisite, corequisite, departmental advisory and/or other limitations on enrollment. A prerequisite is a course or skill that must be completed prior to enrolling in the course. A corequisite is another course that must be taken during the same semester as the course in which you would like to enroll. A departmental advisory is not required, but is a suggested course that would be helpful for you to have completed prior to enrolling.

Students may challenge a prerequisite or corequisite on one or more of the following grounds:

- The student can demonstrate that he/she has the knowledge or ability to succeed in the course or program despite not having satisfied the prerequisite or corequisite.
- The student will be subject to undue delay in attaining his/her educational goal as outlined in his/her student education plan because the prerequisite or corequisite course has not been made reasonably available.
- The prerequisite or corequisite is unlawfully discriminatory or is being applied in a discriminatory manner.
- The prerequisite or corequisite has not been established in accordance with the District's approved process for establishing prerequisites or corequisites or was established in violation of Title V.

It is the student's responsibility to provide documentation to support the challenge. The challenge must be filed in the appropriate Academic Division Office no later than the first week of class. The college will process the challenge within five working days and the student will be advised of the approval or denial. For information on challenging a prerequisite, call staff in the Counseling Office at (909) 384-4404.

Probation and Dismissal

A student will be placed on Academic Probation when his/her current or cumulative grade point average following completion of 12 or more units falls below 2.0. A student will be placed on Progress Probation if, following completion of 12 or more units, he/she receives non-evaluative symbols of "W," "I" and/or "NP" in 50% or more of the units in which he/she has enrolled. A student on Academic or Progress Probation may be dismissed for one semester when one or more of the following conditions exists:

- The student has earned a cumulative grade point average of less than 2.0 for three consecutive semesters.
- The student has received non-evaluative symbols of "W," "I" and "NP" in 50% or more of the units for which he/she was enrolled for three consecutive semesters.

- The student has been on Academic and/or Progress Probation for three consecutive semesters. Students experiencing problems in any class are encouraged to consult with the instructor and a counselor.

Refund Policy for Parking Decals

To be eligible for a refund of the parking decal fee: (a) all classes must be cancelled by the college and such cancellation must result in a student's withdrawal from the college or (b) the student must withdraw from all classes PRIOR to the first day of instruction. The parking decal must be attached to the refund request. Refund Request forms are available through the Campus Business Office, Administration/Student Services Building, Room 206.

Repeating a Course

Beginning in summer 2012 and in compliance with new Title 5 regulations, SBVC students who are attempting to improve a substandard grade in a non-repeatable course will be limited to three enrollments in that course, including any enrollments which took place prior to Summer 2012. For example, if a student initially enrolled in MATH 095 and earned an F, then later enrolled in MATH 095 and withdrew, and again enrolled in MATH 095 and earned a D, that student would no longer be allowed to enroll in MATH 095. Contact the Admissions/Records Office in AD/SS 100 with specific questions.

San Bernardino Community College District Police Department

It is a policy of the Board of Trustees for the San Bernardino Community College District to protect members of the entire college community and the property of San Bernardino Valley College. In accordance with this policy, the District maintains a Police Department 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The officers are sworn and duly Commissioned Police Officers of the State of California as defined in section 830.32 of the Penal Code and 72330 of the California Education Code, and their authority extends to anywhere within the state.

STAR Program

The Success Through Achievement and Retention (STAR) Program (AD/SS Building, Room 201) is a Federal Student Support Trio program that is designed to increase the graduation and transfer rate of students who qualify (based on citizenship status, need for academic support, income, first-generation college student status, and physical or learning disability). The purpose of STAR is to provide a learning support community that will empower students to complete the college-level classes required to obtain a degree and/or transfer. Participants receive tutoring, academic workshops, personal and academic counseling, financial aid counseling, and an opportunity to attend cultural enrichment activities. Student Success Center

The Student Success Center located in the Physical Sciences Building, room 134 provides three tutoring programs: **Mathematics and Science Student Success Program (MSSSP)**, **General Tutoring Program** and **Mathematics Basic Skills Lab**. The **Mathematics and Science Student Success Program (MSSSP)** supports students taking mathematics and/or science courses. The MSSSP has tutoring on a drop-in basis for Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, and Physics, as well as weekly course-specific facilitated workshops for transfer level Mathematics and Science courses. Workshops are constructed, with faculty input and guidance, focused on the concepts and information being presented in class. The facilitators and tutors are trained to help students define their learning styles and to strengthen their study skills. **The General Tutoring Program** provides scheduled individual and small group tutoring sessions. Tutoring services cover a wide range of subjects in the fields of Liberal Arts, Modern Languages, Social Sciences, Humanities, Computer Information Technology, and Mathematics. Also, tutors work with students on learning styles, learning strategies, test taking strategies, and other college survival skills. **The Mathematics Basic Skills Lab** provides drop-in tutoring for Mathematics students. Drop-in Mathematics tutoring is available on Monday through Friday, 8:00am to 9:00pm, Saturdays, 9:00am to 2:00pm.

Substance Abuse

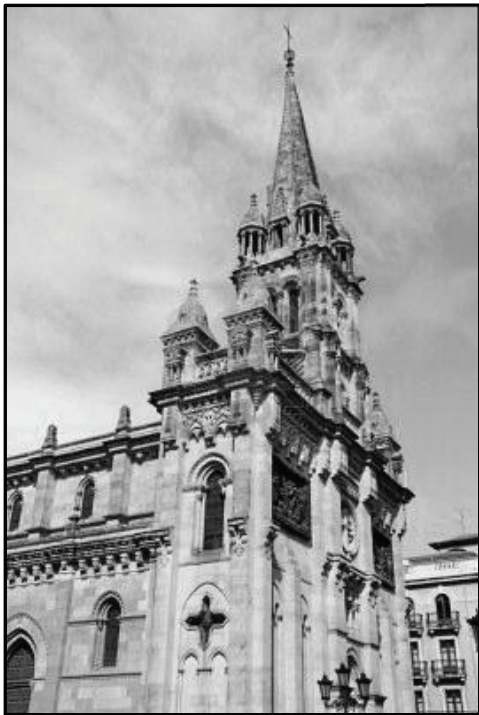

Transfer to the California State University (CSU) and the University of California (UC)



Students who plan to transfer to the UC should refer to the UC Transfer Course Agreement (TCA) for any credit limitation that may apply to courses for their transfer course unit calculation. The TCA may be accessed through ASSIST at www.assist.org. ASSIST provides the most accurate and up-to-date information available about student transfer in California.

Although a course may be designated as transferable to the CSU and/or UC, it may not meet IGETC, CSU GE-Breadth, or major preparation requirements. Major preparation varies from university-to-university at both the UC and CSU.

Students should consult with a counselor and review general education and major requirements. Transfer university representatives meet with students in the Transfer and Career Center.

How Long Will It Take To Complete My Degree?

San Bernardino Valley College offers associate degrees and a wide variety of certificate programs.

The amount of time it will take to complete your associate degree will depend on whether you are attending full-time or part-time, on your level of preparation and the number of prerequisite courses you are required to take. Typically, a student attending full-time with few prerequisite requirements could complete an associate degree in two years. Students attending part-time could take as long as four or five years.

The amount of time it will take to complete your certificate program will depend on whether you are attending full- or part-time, the number of units required for the certificate, the rotation of courses over a one- or two-year sequence, and on the number of prerequisite courses you are required to take. A very limited number of certificate programs can be completed in one semester. The majority will take one or two years if you attend full-time. Consult with the vocational advisor for your program. A list of vocational advisors is found in this schedule.

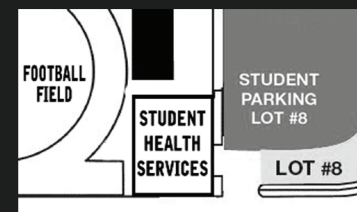
