CATALOG DESCRIPTION

NURS 100, Introduction to the Associate Degree Nursing Program 1 hour lecture = 1 unit

Introduction to core concepts of the nursing curriculum: conceptual framework, anxiety/stress, defense mechanisms, crisis intervention, death and dying, and nursing ethics. Includes student learning responsibilities and strategies for success in the nursing program.

Typical examination question
