- A. Prepare a 1 page written resume summarizing the student's educational qualifications, work experience, and essential personal data in preparation for a job search (see guidelines).
- B. In a small group setting, analyze and discuss a scenario describing an ethical dilemma in nursing practice. Use the ethical decision making process to find a resolution.

#### VII. EVALUATION

- A. Methods of Evaluation
  - 1. Examinations: objective, essay

Typical examination question:

Good Samaritan laws were enacted to:

- a. Encourage more doctors and nurses to become proficient in emergency care
- b. Restrict off-duty health care professionals from rendering on-scene emergency care to accident victims
- c. Reduce fear of being sued when giving emergency care at the scene of an accident
- d. Make it easier to highway accident victims to sue doctors and nurses who give emergency care

Typical essay question:

Read the scenario below and answer the following questions.

a. State the nursing ethical dilemma

- b. List and define 3 key ethical principles that are related to this dilemma and briefly define each.
- c. State 3 possible actions a nurse might take and discuss 2 possible outcomes of each action.
- d. What one nursing action (of the three described) would be best in this situation. Explain why and describe your rationale?
- 2. Graded written resume according to stated criteria
- B. Frequency of Evaluation
  - 1. 2 objective examinations during semester and one essay final exam
  - 2. 1 graded written resume during semester
  - 3. Participation in 2 ethical nursing dilemma discussion groups as scheduled
