Upon completion of the course the student should be able to:

- C. Apply principles of Spanish grammar to new sentences they are constructing;

- E. Construct grammatically correct simple dialogues and narrations in the present and past tenses and the subjunctive mood in Spanish orally and in writing;
- F. Recognize and use appropriate syntax in the construction of original sentences at the intermediate level;
