- B. Analysis: You have been assigned to provide makeup for the "three witches" in Shakespeare's *MacBeth*. In a 4-6 page paper, explain you plan for creating the witches' personas through makeup. Be sure to include their faces, hands, arms, noses, and feet in your analysis.
- C. Project: You have been assigned to provide makeup for a character in the college's upcoming production of *The Rocky Horror Show*. Explain the steps you will take to prepare for this project. With whom will you meet? What questions must be answered? To whom will you be applying makeup? Prepare a written report detailing your preparation.

VII. EVALUATION(S):

- A. Methods of evaluation:
 - 1. Objective and subjective examinations designed to test students' comprehension of course material. Sample test question: Explain the considerations ones must make when working to create three-dimensional makeup.
 - 2. Subjective evaluation of student performance. Students are evaluated on their ability to apply course concepts to theatrical productions presented by the college.
