Course ID: **ART 107**
Course Title: Art History: Africa, Asia, the Americas, and Oceania
Units: 3
Lecture: 3 Hours
Laboratory: None
Prerequisite: None

Catalog and Schedule Description: The survey of art from Africa, Asia, the Americas, and Oceania. Includes examination of the religious and social factors influencing art, artifacts, and architecture.

Associate Degree Applicable

Effective: FA 2004

Rationale: Currently, a version of this course is taught as ART 109: Tribal and Ethnic Art which is cross-listed with ANTHRO 109. Although both versions of ART 109 transfer for general education credit, neither the ARTnor the ANTHRO version of the course meets the CSU major requirement for ART(ART 222 at CSUSB). By changing to the ART 107 version of the course (which has a broader perspective of non-western art), we align our art major with that of Cal State and maintain the general education credit. Once approved and articulated, ART 107 will become a requirement for our associate's degree in Art (to be submitted at a later date). We are also be deleting ART 109 after consultation with the Social Science Division.

Course ID: **CRMJUS 086**
Course Title: Introduction to Crime Scene Investigation
Units: 2 per semester (Note: Per established guidelines, 2.13 rounds down to 2.0.)
Lecture: 24 Hours per semester
Laboratory: 30 Hours per semester
Prerequisite: None

Catalog and Schedule Description: This course is designed to be an introductory level course for those persons considering a career in Forensic Sciences or Criminalistics. Lecture topics include securing a crime scene, identification and collection of evidence at crime scenes, processing evidence and crime scenes for latent fingerprints, basic fingerprint pattern recognition, basic crime scene photography, documentation of the crime scene and the examinations performed, a discussion of common mistakes and how to avoid making them and an introduction to courtroom presentation and testimony.

Course ID: **CRMJUS 087**
Course Title: Intermediate Crime Scene Investigation
Units: 2 per semester
Lecture: 24 Hours per semester
Laboratory: 24 Hours per semester
Prerequisite: CRMJUS 086

Catalog and Schedule Description: This course is designed to be an intermediate level course for those persons considering a career in Forensic Sciences or Criminalistics. Lecture topics include reviewing the critical components of the Basic CSI class, identification and collection of evidence at violent crime scenes, processing evidence and crime scenes for latent prints using advanced techniques, intermediate crime scene photography, documentation of the crime scene and the examinations performed, a discussion of common mistakes and how to avoid making them and courtroom presentation and testimony.

Course ID: **CRMJUS 088**
Course Title: Advanced Crime Scene Investigation
Units: 2 per semester
Lecture: 24 Hours per semester
Laboratory: 30 Hours per semester
Prerequisite: CRMJUS 087

Catalog and Schedule Description: This course is designed to be an advanced level course for those persons considering a career in Forensic Sciences or Criminalistics. Lecture topics include reviewing the critical components of the basic and second level CSI classes, identification and collection of evidence at crime scenes involving death (homicides, suicide, accidental death and homicides that involve additional violence, such as sexual assault), processing of the deceased for physical evidence, latent fingerprints and other clues relating to the identity of the assailant, shooting reconstruction and gravesite excavation. This course will also discuss other specialties available to the death investigator, such as Forensic Anthropology, Entomology and Odontology.

Course ID: **CRMJUS 089**
Course Title: Forensic Photography
Units: 2 per semester
Lecture: 24 Hours per semester
Laboratory: 30 Hours per semester
Prerequisite: None

Catalog and Schedule Description: This course is designed as an overall photography class with an emphasis on techniques needed for crime scene and evidence documentation. This course will discuss different types of cameras used for crime scene documentation, their advantages and disadvantages and special applications. This course will cover manual camera operations necessary for close-up, nighttime and other specialty photographs.

Course ID: **CRMJUS 090**
Course Title: Bloodstain Pattern Analysis
Units: 2 per semester
Lecture: 24 Hours per semester
Laboratory: 30 Hours per semester
Prerequisite: CRMJUS 088 and MATH 093 or MATH 103 or equivalent

Catalog and Schedule Description: This course is designed to be an advanced level course for those persons considering a career in Forensic Sciences or Criminalistics. Lecture topics include the physical properties of blood, the dynamics of blood in flight, mathematical principles relating to bloodstain pattern interpretation and what this information can tell you about the crime that took place.

Rationale all CRMJUS courses: These courses are designed to offer students introductory, intermediate and advanced skills in crime scene investigation.

Course ID: **ENGL 102H**
Course Title: Intermediate Composition and Critical Thinking: **Honors**
Units: 4
Lecture: 4
Laboratory: None
Prerequisite: ENGL 101 or ENGL 101H

Catalog and Schedule Description: Further work in the expository and argumentative essay with emphasis on the critical examination of literature and on analytical and explicatory writing.

Associate Degree Applicable

Effective: FA 2004

Rationale: The English Department does not currently have a honors section of ENGL 102. This course will enhance the Honors Program by allowing students to complete both their ENGL 101 and now ENGL 102 in an honors format, both CSU and UC transferable courses. These courses thus satisfy both honors program requirements but also transfer general education requirements.

Course ID: **PHIL 101H**
Course Title: Introduction to Philosophy: **Honors**
Units: 3
Lecture: 3 Hours
Laboratory: None
Prerequisite: None

Catalog and Schedule Description: General introduction to the major problems of philosophy, with attention directed to classical and modern literature as a basis for discussion of issues such as epistemology, metaphysics, ethics, and aesthetics. Enrollment is limited to students eligible for the Honors Program.

Associate Degree Applicable

Effective: FA 2004

Rationale: The Philosophy Department helped initiate the honors program at SBVC by creating Philosophy 285 almost 10 years ago. However, the model for courses in the honors program has recently changed to the "H" model. Philosophy 101H is intended to replace that earlier version of the honors class and be consistent with the trajectory of classes being developed for the honors program.

Course ID: **RELIG 100H**
Course Title: Introduction to Religious Studies: **Honors**
Units: 3
Lecture: 3 Hours
Laboratory: None
Prerequisite: None

Catalog and Schedule Description: An introductory study of religion, with emphasis on religious experience, the origins and function of religion and religious and theological modes of expression, drawing on Eastern and Western, ancient and modern religious phenomena to help in understanding various religions. Enrollment is limited to students eligible for the Honors Program.

Associate Degree Applicable

Effective: FA 2004

Rationale: Although an honors class in philosophy has existed since the beginning of the honors program at SBVC, the department has never had an honors class in Religious Studies. Religious Studies 100H is intended to complement Philosophy 101H. Both classes satisfy honors program requirements and transfer as general education requirements. And with both courses offered in alternating semesters, students can experience two complementary honors classes in one department.
