Course ID: ACCT 030

Course Title: Federal and State Taxation

Units: 4 Lecture: 4 Hours Laboratory: None

Laboratory: None Prerequisite: None Dept. Advisory: None

Catalog Description: A comprehensive course of study and practical application of basic federal and state income taxes. Includes history and objectives of the tax, research and analysis of current tax issues, along with the tax treatment of various types of entities, types of income, types of deductions and types of credits. Emphasis is on the individual as a taxpayer. Actual tax forms are studied and returns prepared.

Schedule Description: A comprehensive introduction to the basic concepts of federal and state individual income taxation. Actual tax forms are studied and returns prepared.

Rationale: A new course has been created to combine ACCT 131(California Income Taxation, a 2 unit course which covered California state tax) and ACCT 130 (Federal and State Revenue Tax Accounting.)

Course ID: ACCT 047

Course Title: Computerized Accounting

Laboratory hrs: None Prerequisite: None Dept. Advisory: None

Catalog Description: Provides a comprehensive overview of accounting software. Topics covered include the analysis of source documents and the use of accounting software to prepare, understand, and interpret financial statements for a variety of management purposes. Also includes the solution of accounting problems using spreadsheet software and creating spreadsheets using formulas and graphics.

Schedule Description: Provides a comprehensive overview of accounting software. Also includes the solution of accounting problems using spreadsheet software.

Rationale: A new course has been created to combine ACCT 204 (Computer Accounting Spreadsheets, a 1 unit course which covered only the spreadsheet component) and ACCT 207 (Intergrated Accounting Software, a 2 unit course.)

Catalog and Schedule Descriptions: An introductory course exploring the history of life on Earth. The role of natural selection and evidence from geology, biogeography, and paleontology will be combined with fossils and recent organisms to interpret the clues of life's history on Earth.

Rationale: At the present time, the department offers only one lab science course for non-major students, General Biology (BIOL 100). This new course would offer students another biology lab course option besides BIOL 100. There has been such a high demand for a non-major biology lab course that we have reached the limits of lab space available to teach BIOL 100.

Catalog and Schedule Descriptions: Introduction to observational methodologies and techniques used in the study of early childhood behavior including observation, recording, analysis, and interpretation as they relate to developmental principles, theories, and current research.

Rationale: The Child Development department needs to develop the Education program. CD 111 is necessary to implement the Education program at SBVC. CD 111 is designed to meet current practices and standards for teaching observation and methods used in the study of early childhood behavior. It satisfies part of the training requirements for Liberal Studies and Child Development majors.

Course ID: DIESEL 035

Course Title: Heavy-Duty Vehicle Automatic Transmissions

Units: 2 Lecture: 1.5 Hours

Laboratory: 1.5 Hours
Prerequisite: None
Dept. Advisory: None

Catalog and Schedule Descriptions: This course provides theory and hands on experience with heavy-duty vehicle automatic transmissions operation, construction, service and overhaul procedures. The purpose of the class is to prepare the students to successfully troubleshoot and repair heavy-duty vehicle automatic transmissions as well medium-duty vehicle automatic transmissions. Classroom topics include, but are not limited to: torque converter, power flows, vehicle interfaces, and troubleshooting. Lab work will consist of disassembly, inspection of all parts, and transmission reassembly.

Effective: SP 2005

Rationale: Diesel truck technology has changed tremendously over the past decade. Students wishing to enter the field of diesel truck service and repair need a broad understanding of the new technologies. It is imperative that we expose our students to new technologies as much as possible as to ensure their successful transition into the labor force. Technician certification programs are in great demand as the demand for qualified technicians far exceeds supply. Students completing this course will be ready to meet the challenge of the certification tests.

Course Title: Tai Chi

Catalog and Schedule Descriptions: This course is designed to study and practice Tai Chi (a moving meditation) from the introductory through advanced levels. The history, research, and benefits of Tai Chi will be examined, and the basic 12, 24, and 42 forms of Tai Chi will be explored. The course will include individual and group instruction and practice.

Rationale: This will be the first martial arts physical education offering at SBVC. Tai Chi is a tremendously popular physical education activity taught by many institutions, and the department anticipates the course being attractive to a large and culturally diverse population at SBVC.
