Rationale: The San Bernardino Valley College Automotive Program has had discussions with the advisory committee about students who enroll for a year and gain the technical knowledge and skills to enter the industry and do not return to finish the certificates. What the advisory committee recommends and the department would like to do is provide students with instruction that will best prepare them to be hired in an entry-level position so that they may begin their work experience. Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) is the body that certifies technicians across the country, and ASE certification requires two years of work experience along with the passing of a written test to become certified. Two years at the college will count as one year experience so students need to earn an additional year of work experience in order to become certified. The Automotive Technician Certificate takes a full-time student two years to complete. The Preventative Maintenance Technician Certificate is needed to provide students with an attainable short-term goal to aid them in getting an entry-level job and begin their work experience after one year.
